Citizenship Project and Report



1. Young people are the demographic least likely to vote in elections. Conduct a survey of senior cycle students to find out why young people are less likely to vote. Present a summary report of key observations, conclusions and recommendations on this issue to the Electoral Commission and to the relevant Government department.
2. Investigate if the changing nature of contemporary media is driving political polarisation in society today. Plan and deliver an event in your school to share your findings.
3. Investigate the role of the United Nations in maintaining world peace and security today. Using a contemporary example, organise an appropriate action to highlight your findings.
4. Establish through research the human rights challenges arising from some sustainable development measures designed to combat the climate crisis. Create an exhibition or display where you share your findings.



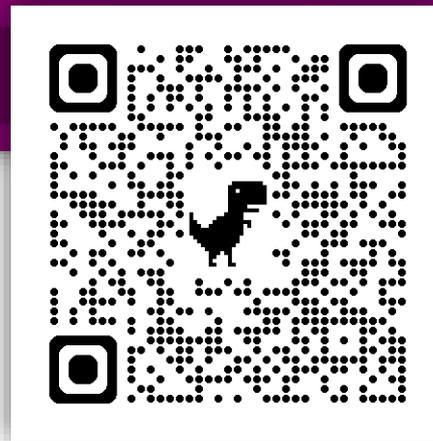

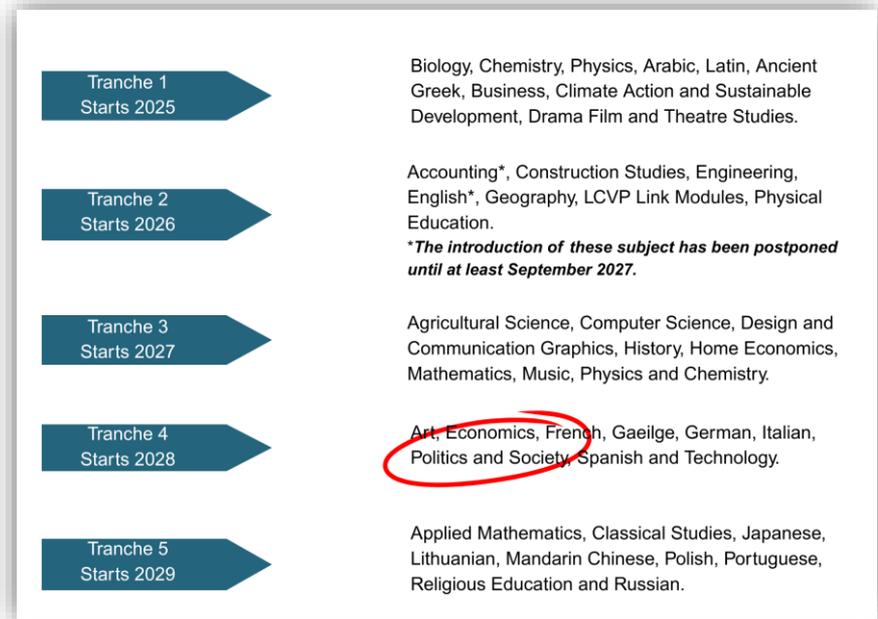

Senior Cycle Redevelopment

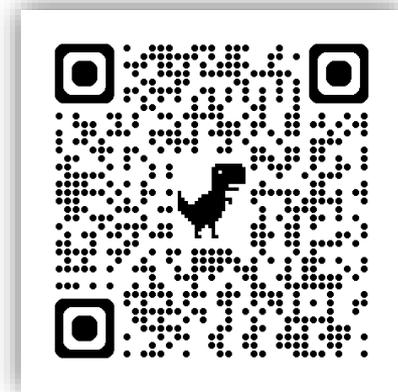
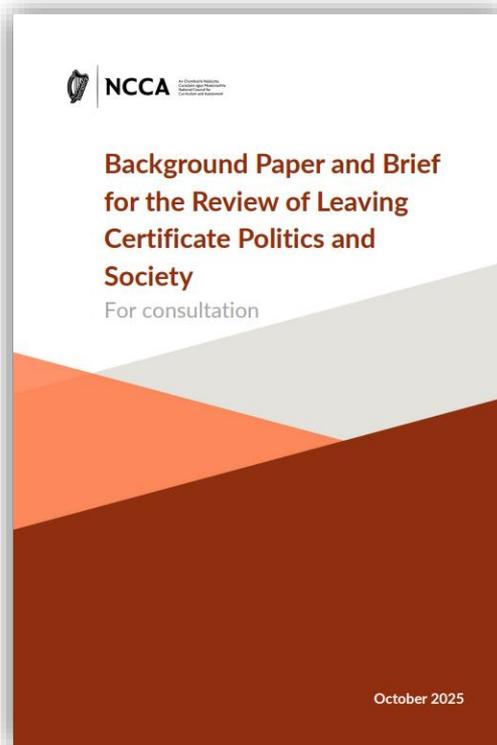
- Tranche 4 – September 2028
- Politics and Society Subject Development Group – first meeting 29th September 2025
- First draft specification – January 2027
- First sample paper – Spring 2028
- Each subject will have an Additional Assessment Component (AAC) worth at least 40% of the available marks
- Sample papers and sample briefs will be released the year prior to teaching the specification
