



A Selection of Short Stories

In the table below, you will see an extract and some associated themes in each short story.

All of these short stories can be used at Junior and Senior Cycle.

'There Will Come Soft Rains' by Ray Bradbury

Animals took shape: yellow giraffes, blue lions, pink antelopes, lilac panthers cavorting in crystal substance. The walls were glass. They looked out upon color and fantasy. Hidden films clocked through well-oiled sprockets, and the walls lived. The nursery floor was woven to resemble a crisp, cereal meadow.

THEMES INCLUDE:

FANTASY NATURE

'Everything Will Be OK' by James Hoe

The kitten is a scrawny thing with burrs and bits of wood caught in its coat where it still has fur, and pus coming out its eyes and nose. Its big baby head looks even bigger at the end of such a stick of a body. I found it in the woods at the end of my street where I play most days with my friends.

THEMES INCLUDE:

RELATIONSHIPS LOVE FAMILY DEATH

'The Selfish Giant' by Oscar Wilde

One morning the Giant was lying awake in bed when he heard some music. It sounded so sweet to his ears that he thought it must be the King's musicians passing by. It was really only a little linnet singing outside his window, but it was so long since he had heard a bird sing in his garden that it seemed to him to be the most beautiful music in the world.

THEMES INCLUDE:

SELF-INTEREST REDEMPTION CHILDHOOD

'Seventh Grade' by Gary Soto

In the homeroom, roll was taken, emergency cards were passed out, and they were given a bulletin to take home to their parents. The principal, Mr. Belton, spoke over the crackling loudspeaker, welcoming the students to a new year, new experiences, and new friendships. The students squirmed in their chairs and ignored him, they were anxious to go to first period.

THEMES INCLUDE:

FANTASY NATURE BULLYING

'His First Flight' by Liam O'Flaherty

The young seagull was alone in his ledge. His two brothers and his sister had already flown away the day before. He had been afraid to fly with them. Somehow when he had taken a little run forward to the brink of the ledge and attempted to flap his wings he became afraid. The great expanse of sea stretched down beneath, and it was such a long way down -- miles down.

THEMES INCLUDE:

SELF-BELIEF COURAGE RESILIENCE

'The Landlady' by Roald Dahl

Billy Weaver had travelled down from London on the slow afternoon train, with a change at Swindon on the way, and by the time he got to Bath it was about nine o'clock in the evening and the moon was coming up out of a clear starry sky over the houses opposite the station entrance.

THEMES INCLUDE:

MYSTERY URBAN LIFE

'The Story of the Hour' by Kate Choppin

She could see in the open square before her house the tops of trees that were all aquiver with the new spring life. The delicious breath of rain was in the air. In the street below a peddler was crying his wares. The notes of a distant song which some one was singing reached her faintly, and countless sparrows were twittering in the eaves.

THEMES INCLUDE:

LOVE MARRIAGE IDENTITY

'The Lottery' by Shirley Jackson

The children assembled first, of course. School was recently over for the summer, and the feeling of liberty sat uneasily on most of them; they tended to gather together quietly for a while before they broke into boisterous play, and their talk was still of the classroom and the teacher, of books and reprimands.

THEMES INCLUDE:

TRADITION HUMAN NATURE SOCIAL ORDER

'The Black Cat' by Edgar Allen Poe

In speaking of his intelligence, my wife, who at heart was not a little tinctured with superstition, made frequent allusion to the ancient popular notion, which regarded all black cats as witches in disguise.

THEMES INCLUDE:

THEMES INCLUDE:

'Fall' by Emma Donaghue

THEMES INCLUDE:
