

Making connections with the continuum of learning



Develop appropriate stances for reading and/or viewing in all literary genres. This means students should...read poetry conscious of its specific mode of using language as an artistic medium.

Develop an awareness of their own responses, affective, imaginative, and intellectual, to aesthetic texts. Explore these responses relative to the texts read, generate and justify meanings and build coherent interpretations.

'The Forge' by Seamus Heaney

All I know is a door into the dark. Outside, old axles and iron hoops rusting; Inside, the hammered anvil's short-pitched ring, The unpredictable fantail of sparks Or hiss when a new shoe toughens in water. The anvil must be somewhere in the centre. Horned as a unicorn, at one end and square, Set there immoveable: an altar Where he expends himself in shape and music. Sometimes, leather-aproned, hairs in his nose, He leans out on the jamb, recalls a clatter Of hoofs where traffic is flashing in rows; Then grunts and goes in, with a slam and flick To beat real iron out, to work the bellows.



Key Vocabulary

Forge – a blacksmith's workshop
Anvil – a heavy iron block used by blacksmiths in shaping iron
Jamb – the side post of a doorway
Bellows – a device used for blowing air into a fire

Some aspects of poetry include...

Content in poetry

The content of a poem is what the poet wants to communicate to the reader and it can be explored and interpreted in various ways. The poem's content can often make it a source of reflection or emotion.

Narrative: Narrative poems have characters, a plot, and often a sequence of events, condensed into poetic form.

Subject Matter: The specific topic or topics that the poem addresses.

Themes: Themes are the central ideas or views that the poem explores.

Social and Cultural Commentary: Some poems address social, cultural, or political issues, providing a platform for critique.

Philosophical Reflections: Poetry often delves into philosophical questions and musings about the human experience, existence, and the nature of reality.

Style in poetry

Style refers to the poet's unique way of using language and literary devices to convey their ideas, emotions, and themes. It is the overall arrangement of the poem. Some poets have a formal structured style, while others prefer free verse.

Style might include elements such as:

- Diction (word selection)
- Use of imagery
- Tone
- Rhythm
- Rhyme scheme
- Stanza structure

Language in poetry

Language is more focused on specific words and expression. It refers to the words and phrases used by the poet to convey their ideas and themes.

Language might includes elements such as:

- Literal language (means exactly what it says)
- Figurative language (uses similes, metaphors, hyperbole, and personification to describe something often through comparison with something different)
- Individual words
- Symbols
