- Consider how these activities might be adapted to suit your context. How might you do this?
- Students may wish to complete some activities individually or in pairs/groups.
- Activities might be completed orally and/or in written format.

Background to the Film:

Based on the classic novel from Louisa May Alcott, *Little Women* tells the story of the four March girls, Meg, Jo, Beth and Amy as they make the transition to womanhood and struggle to conform to society's strict ideals of femininity in the midst of poverty. The story is set in 1860s Massachusetts, USA, during the American Civil War. It is loosely based on Alcott's own childhood. This film is directed by Greta Gerwig.

Before you watch, look at the poster for this film.



Watch the clip from the film. The following activities might be completed in oral and/or written format.

- 1. Would you like to be in this house on Christmas morning? Give reasons for your answer.
- 2. In this clip, the girls mention that "Christmas won't be Christmas without any presents". What does Christmas mean to you?
- 3. Describe the personalities of the sisters. Use any of the adjectives below or your thesaurus to support your description of Jo, Meg, Amy and Beth in this clip.

- 4. In your opinion, what relationship do the girls have with their father? Give reasons for your answer.
- 5. "Merry Christmas World!"
 Describe the scene that Jo views through her window when she wakes up on Christmas morning. How is she feeling? Add this to your description.

Possible Extended Tasks:

- 1. The film is set in the 19th Century during the American Civil War. Research the role of women at this time. Write down 5 pieces of information you uncover.
- 2. What do you think Amy means when she says, "You must not limit yourself"?
- 3. Imagine you are looking out a window in a location of your choice on Christmas morning. Describe the scene. You might like to consider some of the following prompts when creating your descriptive passage:
 - Adjectives and adverbs
 - Description of movement
 - Mood / tension / atmosphere.
